

Ohio Public Health Advisory System update

Highlights

- Number of Red counties: 66 (lowest since Nov. 5)
- Number of Orange counties: 21
- Number of Yellow counties: 1
- 1 county dropped from Red to Yellow: Meigs.
- 9 counties dropped from Red to Orange: Adams, Darke, Guernsey, Harrison, Knox, Morgan, Preble, Putnam, Van Wert.
- 1 county moved from Yellow to Orange: Holmes.



Current as of March 11, 2021. Data updated weekly on Thursdays. Level 3: Very high exposure and spread. Limit activities as much as possible. Level 2: Increased exposure and spread. Exercise high degree of caution. Level 1: Active exposure and spread.



Governor announces benchmark needed to lift health orders

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) COVID-19 case rate measure: Number of cases per 100,000 population.

CDC says that 100 cases per 100,000 or higher reflects a high incidence of COVID-19.

Governor DeWine announced on March 4 that when Ohio reaches **50** cases per **100,000** for two weeks, all health orders will be lifted.








Vaccine eligibility expanded

In response to a significant increase in the amount of vaccine coming into Ohio, Governor Mike DeWine has been rapidly expanding eligibility requirements.

Eligibility changes in March include:

PHASE 1D

During Phase 1 vaccine supply will be limited.

Vaccine administration will be focused on reaching the following groups:

Individuals with:

- Type 2 diabetes
- End-stage renal disease

All available vaccines will be administered to those who choose to receive it.

A Phased Approach

During Phase 1 vaccine supply will be limited.

Vaccine administration will be focused on reaching the following groups:



Individuals with:

Cancer.

- Heart disease.
- Chronic kidney disease (CKD).
- Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD).
- Obesity.

All available vaccines will be administered to those who choose to receive it.





Ohio's Vaccination Program

A Phased Approach



Phase 2C will open vaccinations based on age, beginning with age $\underline{40}$ and older, because the risk of more severe reactions and outcomes of COVID-19 increases with age.





Ohio's Vaccination ProgramA Phased Approach



Phase 2D will open the vaccine to <u>all</u> eligible Ohioans age 16 and up.

Individuals ages 16-17 will be eligible to receive the Pfizer vaccine, the only COVID-19 vaccine authorized for use for those under age 18.
